

San Francisco's Bridge

- One of the most famous <u>sights</u> in the United States is the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. The bridge goes over San Francisco Bay and connects San Francisco and Marin County. Since being built, it has only been closed a few times. This was because of high wind.
- 2 The San Francisco Bridge hangs between two towers. It was the largest suspension bridge in the United States when it was built, but now it is the second largest. It took four years to build the bridge at the cost of 35 million dollars. The longest span on the bridge is 4,200 feet long, and its total length is 8,981 feet long. Golden Gate Bridge is 746 feet high so that ships can pass underneath it. The bridge is 90 feet wide and has four lanes for automobile traffic and two lanes for bicycles and pedestrians.
